Course Description

An examination of the interrelationships between victims and offenders. Topics include patterns of victimization, both historically and demographically. The issues associated with governmental strategies for victim assistance and compensation will also be examined.

Learning Objectives and Outcomes

This course is designed to give the student knowledge and understanding in the areas of:

- Extent of Criminal Victimization
- Costs of Victimization
- Remediating the Plight of Victims
- Victim Rights

Attendance

Students are expected to attend class and arrive on schedule. It is generally considered unacceptable for a student to miss more than 14% of instructional time without a legitimate excuse. Excessive absence may result in the student's withdrawal from the class. The instructor will determine if an absence is excused and determination may be made on a case-by-case basis. Because students arriving late for class may disrupt a class already in progress and distract other students, being tardy may count 1/3 absence.

The maximum number of unexcused absences for this class is – 4.

Information Literacy Learning Outcomes:

- The information literate student determines the nature and extent of the information needed.
- The information literate student accesses needed information effectively and efficiently.
- The information literate student evaluates information and its sources critically and incorporates selected information into his or her knowledge base and value system.
- The information literate student, individually or as a member of a group, uses information effectively to accomplish a specific purpose.
- The information literate student understands many of the economic, legal, and social issues surrounding the use of information and accesses and uses information ethically and legally.

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Instructional Strategies

Chapters from the text will be assigned for study to reinforce the lecture material. Additional media may be used to reinforce major points covered by lecture and discussion and to expose the students to various research and materials. Four examinations will be administered. The final examination will be comprehensive. Students will also submit a research paper (10-15 pages in length) during the term.

Course Requirements

Successful completion of the course requires the student to demonstrate knowledge of course material through performance on the exams and research papers.

Evaluation

Each exam and the research paper will be graded on a scale of 0 – 100. The lowest score on the first three exams may be dropped. The grade on the final exam and research may not be dropped. The final grade for this course will be calculated both utilizing a dropped grade and no dropped grade. The higher average will be counted. One of the two following scales will be applied.

Missed Examinations

Make up examinations will only be administered under the following circumstances:

- A school sponsored event (if the instructor is notified in advance by a faculty or staff member of the university who is the advisor of the organization sponsoring the student's participation)
- A military obligation
- An accommodation due to a documented disability

The student must also make arrangements in advance with the instructor concerning the time for the administration of the make up exam.

Rescheduling the Final Exam

A final exam will be rescheduled only if the student completes the required form (available at the Department Office) and if the request is approved by the instructor and the department head. Requests will be denied if not filed prior to Academic Review Day.

Group Project

The questions from the pre-test will also be included on the final exam. I will make two printed copies (without answers) of the pre-test available to the class as a whole. The class will determine how to best make that information available to every one. As a class, you will make the process of how you disseminate the pre-test available to me in writing two weeks from the first day of class. The two copies will be made available according to the process that you develop. I will not make any other effort to disseminate any other information regarding the pre-test.

Research Papers

The information regarding the research papers is included in a separate document. It is available on my web page. It should answer most questions regarding the requirements of the paper.
